

What have we been learning? Nursery











This week in Nursery, we have been getting ready to celebrate World Book Day on Thursday by reading The Wild by Yuval Zommer. We loved studying the beautiful illustrations and we have painted our own "wilds" and decorated them with a range of collage materials. We have enjoyed playing in a Wild small world tuff tray with jungle animals and vegetation and the ocean world. We all wore green on World Book Day.

In phonics we have been finding out all about the letter and sound B as in ball. We have also looking at letters in each others names and clapping syllables in our names.

In maths we have been revising simple repeating patterns and extending our knowledge of other patterns .

We have been continuing our topic of Space - painting shape rockets, playing in our space Mission Control centre and playing in moon sand. We even made space related cards for Mother's Day. We designed our own robots using Pic Collage App on the iPad. We loved learning to programme the Coda pillars to travel on lots of different pathways.

Finally, we did some mark making - drawing and writing about why we love our mums!

What have we been learning? Nursery



What a busy week it's been! On Monday we had a theatre company come into school to do a show called "Giraffes can't Dance" based on the book by Giles Andrae. We really enjoyed the show and loved the book bags we took home afterwards.

On Tuesday we had a damp Forest School morning. We practised doing clove hitch knots, we played in the mud kitchen, built dens and planted some herbs. On Tuesday afternoon we had PE - we practised making shapes with our bodies and balancing beanbags on different parts of our bodies. We had a competition to see how many times we could land a beanbag on the mat - Mia was the winner!!

On Wednesday we went for a spring walk looking for signs of spring . We saw daffodils 2, buds, catkins, blossom and birds building nests in the trees .

Our sound in our phonics lessons this week is L for Liverpool!!

In maths we continued to make repeating patterns and in BSL we learned some signs for symbols of Easter such as eggs, chicks, bunnies, chocolate, flowers etc.

We had a story about Percy the park keeper in Spring and talked about the story and sequenced the story. We looked at the seesaw photos from this week and discussed them using colourful Semantics. Congratulations to Sadie Mae and Niyah who have both had new baby brothers this week!

This week in reception we have been learning about Jack and the beanstalk. We had a letter from the giant asking us to help him catch Jack as he has taken the giants stuff without asking.

In phonics we have done 've as in glove' and 'wh as in wheel'. We have also started our number bonds to 10!



What have we been learning? Year 1





This week the children have celebrated World Book Day. They all wore green to celebrate our focus text, The Wild. The children wrote hashtags to summarise what they had read from the story and created beautiful collages inspired by what they had seen in the book. In Maths, this week we started our topic of mass and volume. The children looked at objects that are heavier and lighter. They used scales to show this and we started to look at mass of objects and compare. During our Science lesson, we looked at the physical properties of different materials focusing on whether an object may be rough, hard, smooth or fragile. Last week in Art, we focus on the primary and secondary colours, so this week we looked at how colours can make you feel. It has been a lovely week and been great to celebrate a love of reading on World Book Day!





What have we been learning? Year 1

In Year 1, the children have continued their work on mass and volume in Maths. This week we looked at whether an object is full or empty and compared volume and capacity. In English, the children have looked at questions. We learnt what words we use to start questions and to make sure that at the end of every question we always use a question mark. We've focused on the short film the girl and the robot for our writing this week. They used their knowledge to write a letter to the girl after unexpectedly receiving a letter addressed Year 1 from the girl. On Wednesday, all the children wore Blue for Bobby. We spoke to the children about the importance of staying safe near the road and set them a challenge to create their own road safety superhero. In Art, the children looked at different images and had to think about whether the artwork made them feel sad or happy. We spoke about how we can look at the colours used in the image or by looking at the facial expressions. As part of our History topic we looked at cars from the past and compared the first petrol engine car to the cars we know today. The children were fascinated to see how cars had developed over time from discovering that the first petrol engine car had no roof or doors. We've had a great week in Year 1!

Year 2

The idea is, they will make up a story about their robot! This week the children have come up with ideas and they will write their story on Monday. I was blown away with the robots that the children made. In Maths, we began the new topic of mass! We carried out a few investigations and this topic will roll into next week as well. In history, we continued to look at the history of vehicles...this week focusing on the aeroplane. The children wrote their own news paper reports! They can't wait for you to read them on parents evening in a couple of weeks.

The children enjoyed world book day, where we read the story 'The Wild'. As a class, we came up with many reasons why we should save our tree. This was followed up by the children making their own posters, telling the readers the importance of trees and why they should be saved!









What have we been learning?



Another busy week in Year 2! In Science, the children enjoyed investigating electricity and made some circuits to make the lightbulb light up! The children also had a scientific challenge this week to see if they could make posts to balance books!

The week in English, we have finished our robot stories and have moved straight onto non-chronological reports! The children have enjoyed learning lots of facts about hedgehogs so they can write their reports next week! They have learnt lots of facts through the book "The Hodgeheg" by Dick King-Smith. They have thoroughly enjoyed listening to this story this week.

In art, the children have continued to sketch in relation to emotions. They mixed paint and matched colours to the emotions that they sketched. As well as art, the children have enjoyed relaxing when having massage time.





What have we been learning? Year 3















Another busy week in Year 3. We have heard from a few authors this week as part of our World Book Day celebrations. These culminated in an assembly on Thursday about World Book Day and the book we had chosen, The Wild by Yuval Zommer. We had a nice afternoon around the campfire in Forest School playing Chinese whispers and making s'mores. In Maths we have continued with equivalent measurements and using arrays to help us with multiplication problems. Our Wednesday PE lesson got our hearts pumping with lots of sensory exercises like bear walks and crab walks but as always it ended with a good dance. As usual the teachers couldn't get their dancing shoes on quick enough. In Science we used the glockenspiels to investigate pitch whilst talking about sound waves and frequency. The children recognised that the shorter bars made the highest notes.





What have we been learning? Year 3











This week, we were very excited to welcome Kailey from STEMAZING kids. We had SO much fun making and testing the strength of different shaped paper columns. It was a nerve-racking time placing each book on top of another and hoping the four columns did not collapse - there were many trembling hands and crossed fingers! We discovered that circular columns are the strongest and then spotted that the Romans liked to use them when we ordered our Invaders & Settlers timeline. In English, we completed our stories with familiar settings before editing them and beginning our final versions. Our fine motor skills and joined handwriting are also coming on a treat!

On Wednesday, we all wore blue to remember Bobby and learnt about how to keep safe on the roads. In Reading Explorers, we read a wonderful picture book called The Tunnel by Anthony Browne and in Science, we have continued to investigate sound. In Maths, we've had a week exploring different aspects of number including multiples of 10, facts families and column subtraction. We've also been taking part in The Big Plastic Count, tallying the plastic packaging we have used at lunch times and are looking forward to adding up our final totals. We've really enjoyed being creative with images in Computing as well as with watercolour in Art, painting our versions of Roald Dahl characters - we definitely have lots of budding Quentin Blakes in Y3!

We have had a very busy week in year 4, in maths we have been working on multiplications with 2digit numbers. In English we have enjoyed watching some of our favourite authors on zoom to celebrate world book day, the children have also produced some amazing work around the book The Wild, they have designed posters and written poems giving the wild a voice.

This week in PSHE year 4 have been working on their self esteem and building on the things we love about ourselves. In maths we have been working hard on our multiplications with 2-digit numbers. Year 6
























What have we been learning? ORB 2











Well we've had the busiest week in junior DRB: it was so busy we ran out of photograph space! Last Friday we ventured over to Chinatown, we were in ore of the magnificent arch which was gifted to Liverpool from Shanghai in time for Chinese New Year 2000. The arch is an outstanding 13.5 meters high and is detailed with 200 dragons! The children spent time taking in the Chinese culture and historical differences and similarities of buildings as well as exploring a Chinese supermarket. On Monday, the buzz of our visit to China was still in the air which lead us nicely on to tasting the food we purchased at the supermarket. The children had the opportunity to taste; noodles, egg fried rice, sweetcorn soup, prawn crackers, fortune cookies, dumplings, tofu, broad bean crisps. The children have also spent time learning about the Great Wall of the China as well as fact finding information on the Shang Dynasty's first emperor Cheng Tang. Did you know that Tang came into power 1600BC?



Measles

Message for parents and guardians of children from the Director of Public Health Professor Matthew Ashton

Have you heard the news about measles? There is a large outbreak of measles around Birmingham. Many children have been admitted to hospital. It is likely that measles could spread to Liverpool.

Measles is a nasty infection and can make you very sick if you catch it. It starts with a high temperature and a cold with red eyes. Then you get a measles rash that spreads from your face to the rest of your body.

It is very easy to catch if you are not vaccinated. It spreads through coughs and sneezes.

Measles can be very serious for some people. It can cause pneumonia, encephalitis (brain infections) and sometimes even death.

How to protect yourself and your children from measles:

The MMR vaccine prevents measles. It is very safe. You need 2 doses to protect you for life.

All children are offered the MMR vaccine. It is free on the NHS.

If your child has missed any vaccine, book an appointment at your GP practice. Check your child's Red Book if you are not sure or ask the GP practice.

It is never too late to catch up if you have missed a vaccine.

Is my child too ill for school?



It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school or nurserywhen they're unwell.

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about <u>managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK</u>. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school or nursery on the first day. Let them know that your child won't be in and give them the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let their teacher know.

Other illnesses Follow this advice for other illnesses:

Coughs and colds

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor <u>cough</u> or <u>common cold</u>. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

High temperature

If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

Chickenpox

If your child has <u>chickenpox</u>, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a cold sore.

Encourage them not to touch the blister or to share things like cups and towels.

Conjunctivitis

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have conjunctivitis.

Get advice from your pharmacist. Encourage your child not to rub their eyes and to wash their hands regularly.

COVID-19

If your child has mild symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can go to school. Your child should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people if they have symptoms of COVID-19 and they either:

- have a high temperature
- do not feel well enough to go to school or do their normal activities

Ear infection

If your child has an <u>ear infection</u> and a high temperature or severe earache, keep them off school until they're feeling better or their high temperature goes away.



Hand, foot and mouth disease

If your child has <u>hand</u>, foot and <u>mouth disease</u> but seems well enough, there's no need to keep them off school. Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues straight away and to wash their hands regularly.

Head lice and nits

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice but tie hair back.

You can treat <u>head lice and nits</u> without seeing a GP.

Impetigo

If your child has impetigo, they'll need treatment from a GP, often with antibiotics.

Keep them off school until all the sores have crusted over and healed, or for 48 hours after they start antibiotic treatment.

Encourage your child to wash their hands regularly and not to share things like towels and cups.

Ringworm

If your child has <u>ringworm</u>, see your pharmacist unless it's on their scalp, in which case you should see a GP. It's fine for your child to go to school once they have started treatment.

Scarlet fever

If your child has <u>scarlet fever</u>, they'll need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks.

Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

Slapped cheek syndrome (fifth disease)

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have <u>slapped cheek syndrome</u> because, once the rash appears, they're no longer infectious.

But let the school or teacher know if you think your child has slapped cheek syndrome.

Sore throat

You can still send your child to school if they have a <u>sore throat</u>. But if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away.

A sore throat and a high temperature can be symptoms of tonsillitis.

Threadworms

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have threadworms.

Speak to your pharmacist, who can recommend a treatment.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

Children with <u>diarrhoea or vomiting</u> should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).
