Curriculum

This half-term, the curriculum focuses on the theme of Social Justice & Equity.

Year 1 & 2

Year 3 & 4

Year 5 & 6


A unit about **gender equality**; kings and queens
 through history, **comparison** of Elizabeth I

and Elizabeth II; study of **castles**.

Children learn that knowledge is discovered and built upon through generations; study of the **Ancient Greeks** and influence on today's world, in particular magnetism and **democracy**.

A study of **Shakespeare**'s Romeo & Juliet and exploration of the issues within the play, which still resonate today. Focus on communicative and **collaborative skills**.







This half-terms topic of Social Justice and Equity encourages the children to start thinking about fairness and how different groups in our global society may be treated better or worse than others. Our younger children read 'The Paper Bag Princess' where the princess saves the prince, and they learn about kings and queens, comparing gender equality and stereotypes in the past and now. Older children learn about the Ancient Greeks, focusing on how knowledge is discovered and passed down through history. They also enjoy the Greek myths, learning about famous gods and heroes. Our oldest children study Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. They'll learn about the playwright and find out why his plays are still so popular today. Using the play as a starting point, they'll think about street crime, gangs and peer pressure, and most

What have we been learning?












Hello to all the children, parents and carers in Year 2.

What have we been learning? Year 3







Year 3 have loved the first full week of their new Inclusive Curriculum unit exploring the Ancient Greeks! When a mystery box appeared in our classroom, we read the story of Pandora's Box before debating whether to open it or not! We learnt about the origins of democracy in Ancient Greece before casting our vote in the ballot box. The majority voted to open the box and luckily (unlike Pandora's Box), it was full of sweet treats! We were also excited to discover the way Ancient Greeks enjoyed the theatre and designed our own masks. In English, we have looked Zeus and his fellow Gods and Goddesses from Greek Mythology and in Maths, we have explored place value and counting in 10s. We also had lots of fun in Science too, investigating attraction and repulsion and finding out when magnets were first discovered . . . you guessed it - in Ancient Greece!





What have we been learning? Year 4





Year 4 have had a cracking first two weeks back to school! They have settled in well and have already produced some fantastic creative writing based around our theme of Ancient Greece. In English, we researched Greek Gods and Goddesses and wrote a detailed character description of Zeus. We discovered our very own Pandora's Box had been mysteriously left in our classroom, so we held a class vote to decide whether to open the box or keep it closed! This taught us all about democracy (which the Ancient Greeks created!) The majority voted for open and luckily for us, it was filled with delicious cookies! In Maths we have been looking at Place Value, focusing on numbers up to 1,000. We used our Base 10 in class to represent and partition our hundreds, tens and ones and have finished this week with counting to 1,000 on a number line. To celebrate Roald Dahl's birthday, we created our own characters with Mr. England and read 'The Witches.'





What have we been learning?



Year 5











Year 5 have made a fantastic start to their year! We have been very impressed by the way in which the children have settled into class and worked incredibly hard. The class have begun

their topic this week and have researched the Tudors! There was so many fantastic historians and we have been so impressed with their research skills. I am sure these abilities will come in handy when we research the mighty William Shakespeare! The class have begun their PE unit in fitness and have been sending and receiving objects. In art, we finished off our self portraits and in Science we really enjoyed starting to learn about the heart and its different features! We then finished the week of with some religion and a bit of chess!





What have we been learning? Year 6





Year 6 have had an amazing start back to school! All of us adults in year 6 have been so impressed with their hard working and positive attitude to learning and think they are setting an amazing example as the oldest in the school.

In our first week back we all got to know each other and tested our teamwork and communication with some team building activities and turns our making towers from spaghetti and blutack proved quite difficult!

We have got stuck into our new topics and our Inclusive Curriculum topic for this term, Romeo and Juliet. In English we started by looking at biographies, their features and analysing different biographies in preparation for writing our own Shakespeare biography next week. In maths everyone was done so well with our new place value topic, involving writing and reading numbers up to 10 million!

A highlight of last week was completing our first mile run as a class where all of year 6 completed the course and more importantly encouraged and cheered each other all the way round! In art we have been creating self portraits looking at proportion and scale as well as using different shading techniques to add tone. We also put these skills into practice in science where children drew the anatomy of the heart and they looked amazing! We then recreated the role of the heart outside, acting as the blood flow collecting 'oxygen' from the lungs and delivering it to the rest of the body. Then to finish's a busy week on Thursday we celebrated Roald Dahl day looking at the BFG and creating our own dream jars. It's safe to say year 6 is full of are aspiring footballers, Olympians and musicians! Well done on an amazing start to term year 6 keep it up!



What have we been learning? ORB 1



We've had an incredible start to the school year! During our first week, the children had a great time sharing their holiday stories with friends, and we were amused to find that everyone had been to a swimming pool over the summer!





Dear parents,

Places are now available to join a new 12-week football course every Thursday at Cardinal Heenan, which is open to both boys and girls.

Our courses teach children correct football techniques by FA qualified coaches who have full DBS (CRB) clearance to work with children. The structure for the course is 'FUN through Football,' building confidence for total beginners and moving onto more complex sessions for experienced players.

We provide a ball per player for the majority of our drills ensuring children get more touches of the ball and improve quicker than conventional coaching where children are waiting around to have a turn. The sessions are held in the fantastic sports hall so trainers should be worn. Players are also advised to bring a still drink for the session.

The club has links to local junior teams of which players will be able to play for at the weekend. Players who show advanced ability on the course will be recommended for trials at professional academies. Players who have previously attended courses are currently playing for Blackburn Rovers, Preston North End, Manchester United, Liverpool, Blackpool, Everton, Burnley, Bolton, Oldham, Rochdale and Wigan.

The cost of the course is just £6.25 per week, which is payable in two instalments. The first payment of £25 is due when booking your child on and the second payment of £50 due at the first session. Parents are encouraged to watch the sessions but are welcome to leave children, as every session is fully supervised.

NEW TOURNAMENT FORMAT

Every four weeks we have a tournament in order for the children to put their new-found skills into practice with medals awarded at the end of the course for various categories.

ALL PLAYERS WILL RECEIVE A TROPHY AND MEDAL at the presentation, which is held on the final week of the course. Additional trophies will also be awarded in each group from categories including; Best Attitude, Star Player, Most Improved Player, Most Promising Player and Hardest Working Player.

Is my child too ill for school?



It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school or nursery when they're unwell.

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about <u>managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK</u>. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school or nursery on the first day. Let them know that your child won't be in and give them the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let their teacher know.

Other illnesses Follow this advice for other illnesses:

Coughs and colds

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor <u>cough</u> or <u>common cold</u>. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

High temperature

If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

Chickenpox

If your child has <u>chickenpox</u>, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a cold sore.

Encourage them not to touch the blister or to share things like cups and towels.

Conjunctivitis

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have conjunctivitis.

Get advice from your pharmacist. Encourage your child not to rub their eyes and to wash their hands regularly.

COVID-19

If your child has mild symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can go to school. Your child should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people if they have <u>symptoms of COVID-19</u> and they either:

- have a high temperature
- do not feel well enough to go to school or do their normal activities

Ear infection

If your child has an <u>ear infection</u> and a high temperature or severe earache, keep them off school until they're feeling better or their high temperature goes away.



Hand, foot and mouth disease

If your child has <u>hand</u>, foot and <u>mouth disease</u> but seems well enough, there's no need to keep them off school. Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues straight away and to wash their hands regularly.

Head lice and nits

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice but tie hair back.

You can treat <u>head lice and nits</u> without seeing a GP.

Impetigo

If your child has impetigo, they'll need treatment from a GP, often with antibiotics.

Keep them off school until all the sores have crusted over and healed, or for 48 hours after they start antibiotic treatment.

Encourage your child to wash their hands regularly and not to share things like towels and cups.

Ringworm

If your child has <u>ringworm</u>, see your pharmacist unless it's on their scalp, in which case you should see a GP. It's fine for your child to go to school once they have started treatment.

Scarlet fever

If your child has <u>scarlet fever</u>, they'll need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks.

Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

Slapped cheek syndrome (fifth disease)

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have <u>slapped cheek syndrome</u> because, once the rash appears, they're no longer infectious.

But let the school or teacher know if you think your child has slapped cheek syndrome.

Sore throat

You can still send your child to school if they have a <u>sore throat</u>. But if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away.

A sore throat and a high temperature can be symptoms of tonsillitis.

Threadworms

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have threadworms.

Speak to your pharmacist, who can recommend a treatment.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

Children with <u>diarrhoea or vomiting</u> should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).
