What have we been learning? Nursery

What have we been learning? Nursery

What have we been learning? Reception

What have we been learning? Year 1



This week the children have been getting into the Christmas spirit. Santa came to visit our class and read them a story which they were all in awe of. They also visited Santa's grotto and enjoyed a wearing their Christmas jumpers. They've worked really hard on their Christmas performance; the children should be so proud of themselves. In English, the children wrote about their own Happiness Island describing what it would be like. In Maths, we've explored 3D shapes this week which the children have shown great progress in naming and describing different shapes. In computing, the children learnt how to insert a picture onto a word document. They ended the week with toy day which they all thoroughly enjoyed. The children played their games nicely with their friends which was lovely to see. We hope all our families have a lovely weekend before the last week in school as the week after will be our Christmas break.





What have we been learning? Year 2





I'm so proud of the children in my class, still focusing and learning despite all of the Christmas distractions going on around them! In English, they've been reflecting on their own best memories of family, friendship, outside activities and games. They're going to use this self reflection to craft a story about visiting their own Happiness Island, using descriptive language. In Design and Technology, they completed their sewing project - creating and decorating hand puppets with felt, needle and thread. They also enjoyed forest school this week. They searched for Christmas emblems hidden around the area and enjoyed hide and seek and the mud cafe with their friends. I myself sampled a very earthy cappuccino...

We've also managed to fit in some practice sessions for our upcoming Christmas performance too. The children are in fine voice I must say. Have a great weekend everyone!



What have we been learning? Year 2



Christmas is so close in Year 2 that it is amazing we can get any work done at all - but we do manage somehow! In Mathematics, the children are developing their understanding of subtraction. They are completing sums using beads on a rekenrek, counters on a Ten Square and with Base Ten blocks too. We also try to give their skills some real world context too, whenever we can. We use online supermarkets to add up our shopping, whether it's bread, eggs and beans or toys from Smyths, before taking away what we've spent from our budget. This helps us to understand how we will use these skills later in life. Plus, there's no harm in helping children to have a better understanding of how much things actually cost! In Science, we're looking at the senses. How particular parts of the body help us to engage with the world, to stay safe, but also to enjoy the wonderful sights, smells and sounds around us. Our study of the senses feeds into our English writing project too, as we are using sense adjectives to fully describe our important memories.

We've also been studiously practicing our Christmas performance songs and poems (they're sounding wonderful already), as well as making crafts to sell at the fair. We mixed our own salt dough, shaped it into Christmas tree ornaments, asked Julie our school chef to bake them in the oven and then we painted them in festive colours. It has to be said, the highlight of our week was a visit on Tuesday from Father Christmas and Mrs Claus! We sang a carol to them and then Santa read us a lovely story. The children were delighted. Goodbye for now from us busy bees. Have a great weekend!







Year 3





Year 3 have had a lovely week of festive activities. They began their week decorating and making Christmas decorations for the Fayre; the glitter was everywhere! Santa came to visit our class with Mrs Claus and we were able to see his grotto before the after school event. The children were happy to share what they'd like for Christmas. In Science we have been learning about our eyes and our sight. The children loved our experiment learning how our eyes change depending upon how much light there is. In English we have been looking at poetry for our performance and learning about Tilly Lockey and her bionic arms. In Maths we have been continuing our multiplication work and how to cross a hundred when doing addition and subtraction. The biggest part of our week has been practising our Christmas Performance on the stage. The children enjoyed our dress rehearsal for Ms CB and Mr England on Friday morning; they were very impressed! The children are now looking forward to performing it for you on Monday afternoon and Wednesday morning of next week.





What have we been learning? Year 4



Year 4 have been busy this week rehearsing for our Christmas play! We are looking forward to performing for our families and it has got us in the Christmas spirit! In English we have been planning our magazine articles on the fantastic Tilly Lockey and we hope to have them published next week.

In maths we have been continuing to focus on our times tables. Some of the children have been out with Mrs Rees to work on their bronze award for the 11 times tables!

A highlight of this week has been our visit from Knowsley Safari park. They did a workshop with the class focusing on endangered animals and how we can protect them. This tied in well with our reading explores text this week, as we read a magazine article all about the Albatross and how the Albatross Task Force have been working to protect them from trawl fishing.





What have we been learning? Year 4



Wow! What a busy but magical week in Year 4! We have been working hard each day rehearsing for our Christmas play and our dress rehearsal on Friday was smashing!! In maths we have been completing our end of term assessments and in English we have been finishing of our drafts for our magazines which we will publish next week. What have we been learning? Year 5

What have we been learning? Year 6





Year 6 have been getting into the festive spirit this week with some festive crafts, making Christmas trees in Forest school and lots of Christmas play practice. In class, we have been looking at beauty standards, body image and how to use persuasive language to reply to negative comments online. Year 6 wrote some great persuasive paragraphs in response to negative comments towards Katarina Johnson Thompson and their passion and understanding of the topic was amazing to see! We are looking forward to using these skills to write to different beauty companies next week to inspire change! We also had a great visit from Knowsley safari park on Wednesday and really enjoyed exploring conservation and identifying different animals based on their features, it was definitely trickery than they though.





What have we been learning? Year 6

This week, we've embraced the festive spirit in our classroom by putting up our Christmas tree! The children had so much fun decorating it with twinkling lights and festive touches, transforming our space into a Christmas wonderland. On Monday, we had some special visitors—mischievous elves who were even spotted hanging from our classroom door! These cheeky elves will be keeping an eye on who is working hard and displaying wonderful behaviour each day.

The children have been busy rehearsing Christmas songs for our upcoming performances, signing them beautifully in BSL. They have been working so hard and we can't wait to share these special moments with you all!

This week in science, we've been learning all about our bodies, including identifying and labelling the five senses: sight, taste, hearing, smell, and touch.

In EYFS, we've been strengthening our fine motor skills and upper body muscles with an exciting activity called 'Scribble Disco.' The children loved lying on their tummies, listening to lively music, and scribbling on large rolls of paper. This playful activity helps build the muscles in their hands while having loads of fun!

In Maths this week, we have been continuing to learn about addition. To make learning both fun and engaging, we have used a range of methods: some children used mental addition, while others used written methods such as number lines or column addition. Some children benefited from a more hands-on learning approach and used manipulatives such as counters or blocks.

During Ann's BSL lessons she has been teaching the children about the Christianity story of Jesus. Ann highlighted Jesus' teaching of inclusivity and diversity by showing love for all and acceptance of everybody.

On Wednesday we enjoyed a Winter Road Show delivered by Knowsley Safari Park. The session focused on the Amur Tiger Conservation Project: we learnt how the Amur Tiger likes to live in solitary and that they urinate on trees to let other tigers know that the area is occupied. The scent of tiger urine was passed around the hall — we now understand why tigers stay away from one another's areas! We also discovered that sadly, there are only 550 Amur Tigers left in the wild.

Snowflakes sparkled as they explored icy landscapes dotted with twinkling lights. 



Is my child too ill for school?



It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school or nursery when they're unwell.

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about <u>managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK</u>. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school or nursery on the first day. Let them know that your child won't be in and give them the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let their teacher know.

Other illnesses Follow this advice for other illnesses:

Coughs and colds

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor <u>cough</u> or <u>common cold</u>. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

High temperature

If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

Chickenpox

If your child has <u>chickenpox</u>, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a <u>cold sore</u>.

Encourage them not to touch the blister or to share things like cups and towels.

Conjunctivitis

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have conjunctivitis.

Get advice from your pharmacist. Encourage your child not to rub their eyes and to wash their hands regularly.

COVID-19

If your child has mild symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can go to school. Your child should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people if they have <u>symptoms of COVID-19</u> and they either:

- have a high temperature
- do not feel well enough to go to school or do their normal activities

Ear infection

If your child has an <u>ear infection</u> and a high temperature or severe earache, keep them off school until they're feeling better or their high temperature goes away.



Hand, foot and mouth disease

If your child has hand, foot and mouth disease but seems well enough, there's no need to keep them off school. Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues straight away and to wash their hands regularly.

Head lice and nits

There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice but tie hair back.

You can treat <u>head lice and nits</u> without seeing a GP.

Impetigo

If your child has impetigo, they'll need treatment from a GP, often with antibiotics.

Keep them off school until all the sores have crusted over and healed, or for 48 hours after they start antibiotic treatment.

Encourage your child to wash their hands regularly and not to share things like towels and cups.

Ringworm

If your child has <u>ringworm</u>, see your pharmacist unless it's on their scalp, in which case you should see a GP. It's fine for your child to go to school once they have started treatment.

Scarlet fever

If your child has <u>scarlet fever</u>, they'll need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks.

Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

Slapped cheek syndrome (fifth disease)

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have <u>slapped cheek syndrome</u> because, once the rash appears, they're no longer infectious.

But let the school or teacher know if you think your child has slapped cheek syndrome.

Sore throat

You can still send your child to school if they have a <u>sore throat</u>. But if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away.

A sore throat and a high temperature can be symptoms of tonsillitis.

Threadworms

You don't need to keep your child off school if they have threadworms.

Speak to your pharmacist, who can recommend a treatment.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

Children with <u>diarrhoea or vomiting</u> should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).
