


# Inf. DRB

# Year 2

!It's been a great week here in Year 2. Everyone enjoyed getting our new fossil set out from the science cupboard to use in our Art lesson. We looked very carefully at the samples and photos and then used fine liner pens to sketch them. In the next lesson, we'll use watercolour paints to add detail and texture. In Maths, the children have been practicing adding and subtracting by ten, noticing how the number in the tens column changes. We're getting much more confident with using our number bonds to ten in more complex addition and subtraction sums too. In English, we're examining our feelings and building a rich collection of adjectives to describe them. In P.E. Our new topic for this term is jumping and landing and we're developing our techniques well. The children are working very hard indeed. Have a great weekend!



## Year 3



It's been a week of special events with Anti-Bullying lessons and assemblies, fundraising for Children in Need and Remembrance Day. We learnt all about why we wear poppies and stood beautifully for the two minutes silence in class. We were so respectful - our teachers were very proud of us. Pudsey has, of course, been a theme throughout the week. Our Seesaw homework was to write a Pudsey acrostic poem - we certainly have lots of ROARsome poets in Year 3! We also found out about the first Pudsey Bear, made in 1985, who actually had brown fur and a red bandana! We created expanded noun phrases to describe Pudsey (as he is now) and made our own little Pudsey Bears.



### Year 4

Year 4 have had a very nice week. They have explored area in maths using concrete resources to explore making shapes and finding the area. Later in the week, they moved on to multiplying and dividing and have made a really good start to this topic. They really enjoyed exploring "poo clues" in science and using their knowledge about animals to make predictions. They explored painting for the first time this year mixing primary colours to make secondary colours as well as exploring warm and cool colours and then adding further detail with tints and shades. They explored the city of Liverpool in history researching information online to create a fact file. The children also really enjoyed exploring pitch in their music lesson and using the keyboards.

## Year 5





Year 5 have had a very exciting week taking part in art, music and dance lessons with the pupils expressing their creativity through different mediums. In art, we have been starting our final pieces based around our Benin Art, we used a mixture of materials like charcoal and watercolour paint to produce detailed and textured pieces. In English, we have been exploring speeches and we have been inspired by Martin Luther King to write our own speech on 'Our dreams for the world' which we will preform in class next week! It was great to finish the week with Pudsey Day on Thursday as we brought in teddies, dressed in yellow and completed some Children In Need themed tasks in the afternoon.



## Year 6

Year 6 have had a great week. They have been busy writing speeches inspired by Martin Luther King Jr's 'I have a dream' speech, writing all about their hopes for a perfect world. They are sounding very inspirational and we are excited to perform these soon. Another highlight of this week was in science, where we created our own levers to investigate how lever length affects its strength. We used lollypop sticks to create catapults and had lots of fun testing their strength with marshmallows. It was also great to see lots of our year 6 children making the most of new clubs this week, learning new skills in netball and music club. Keep up the hard work year 6.

It's been a thought-provoking week in Junior DRB! We've been learning about and celebrating two very special days – Armitage Day and Children in Need.

On Tuesday, we focused on Armitage Day. The children learnt about why this day is so important and how it gives us a chance to remember and thank those who have helped and protected others.
